The buildings will give us much-needed space to expand these two programs. Paid for by CARES Act funds, the project will be completed in time for the 2024-25 school year.

We also continue to collect names and donations for the Veterans Wall of Honor that will be constructed in front of Lima Senior. Inside you will find details on how to get a name on the wall, as well as how to donate to make this project happen. No district money is being used.

The 2023-24 Spartan school year kicks off Wednesday, Aug. 16, and we can't wait!

LIMA SENIOR AUDITORIUM NAMED AFTER JAZZ GREAT JOE HENDERSON

It was a special night of celebrating the life of Jazz legend and Lima's own Joe Henderson, as Lima Senior named its auditorium after the South High School graduate.

The Joe Henderson Auditorium was dedicated April 27 with a special program, jazz music, and a grateful Henderson family.

"What we are doing here tonight is a long-time coming and I thank all those who have made it possible," Superintendent Jill Ackerman said during the program. "It is important for our students to know about the successful graduates who have come before them and their contributions to their communities, and in Joe's case, the world."

Joe was born, April 24, 1937, one of 15 children in a family that encouraged him to study music. He graduated from Lima's South High School in 1953. It was during his time at South that a teacher introduced him to the tenor saxophone.

Joe was playing in the Detroit jazz scene by the time he was 18 years old, and after college and serving in the U.S. Army, moved to New York City, where his career took off.

His first album "Page One" was released in 1963 under the Blue Note Records label. Joe led four other sessions and appeared on nearly 30 albums during the next four years.

During his 40-year career, Joe performed and recorded with some of the greatest jazz musicians around the world, including Freddie Hubbard and Herbie Hancock. He also played with Blood Sweat and Tears and other Rock and R&B groups. Joe was nominated for Six Grammy Awards and won four.

Joe was inducted into the Lima City Schools Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 1993. Joe recorded his last album "Porgy and Bess" in 1997 and a year later suffered a stroke that kept him from performing. He died at the age of 64 in San Francisco, on June 30, 2001.

The dedication program included remarks from Henderson family members, a video tribute from Lima Senior graduate and jazz musician Brandon Monford (Sax B), music from the Lima Senior Jazz Band, and the unveiling of a painting of Henderson.

Artist Frederick J. Brown created the "Young Joe Henderson" painting during a visit to Lima in 2008. He was here doing a residency with students in the Lima City Schools. Brown was a nationally known artist who did an extensive portrait series of jazz and blues musicians and had done a Henderson portrait before coming to Lima. Brown died in 2012. The painting hangs outside the auditorium.

Why were you interested in the Lima Senior coaching position? When I say it is my dream job, I mean I wanted to go somewhere where I could build a program. I wanted to be some place where I could make the biggest impact in kids' lives. When this position came available. I knew this was where I wanted to be. I definitely believe there are plenty of athletes walking the halls at Lima Senior who are going to make us a successful football program. Building relationships is very important to me. I love people, I love kids. The players have been awesome. They're excited to be a part of the new era of Lima Senior football.

When looking at our current athletes and team, what do you see? What are the positives and what needs worked on? We have a great group of young men. They work very hard in the weight room and we are setting records with attendance so far this summer. We have great team speed and we are preparing to get better every day. We need to work on doing the little things right on and off the field. Doing things the SPARTAN Way.

We've heard you talk about running a pass-dominated offense. Tell us more about that and why that should be the focus for this team. Our offensive system produces an exciting brand of football where fans love to come watch and players love to practice every day. We will be going at a crazy pace and it will even put pressure on the referees to get going faster. We want to get the ball to our athletes and let them make plays. We want to stretch the field horizontally and vertically to put pressure on the defense.

How will you work to build relationships with current players and the next

generation of Spartan players? We are looking to build relationships with our players by being involved with them all year round. Not just about football, but about their lives and families. Our program will be K-12. We want all of our future Spartans to know us as coaches at the high school.

How will you grow the Lima Senior football program? Everything we do comes back to relationships. It will be what we do outside of the football season where we will see program growth. I will say that when you are winning everyone wants to be a part of the Friday Night Lights. We cannot wait to see the crowd at the first home game (Sept. 25) when we take on the Findlay Trojans. It will be a great atmosphere against a great opponent. We want people to know we are working hard and WE'RE COMING!

RENEWAL LEVY NOT A NEW TAX, NO ADDITIONAL COST TO TAXPAYERS

Voters will see a renewal levy for the Lima City Schools on this November's ballot. It is not a new tax and will not cost taxpayers any additional money.

The 10-year, 7.68-mill renewal levy will raise \$2.27 million for the district to be used for general operations.

The renewal first appeared on the ballot 10 years ago when the district combined two existing levies that voters had been supporting separately every five years. The decision was made then to move to a 10-year issue to provide more financial stability for the district.

The money is used for general operations, including supplies, utilities and staffing.

The renewal levy will be on the Nov. 7 ballot.

- Lima Senior Early Childhood Education Student Bailey Hoover qualified for the Educators Rising National Competition. She is the first Lima Senior student to advance to Nationals.



- Math Curriculum Leader Cathy Collins was the 2022 winner of the Ohio Council of Teachers of Mathematics Linda M. Gojak Middle School Award.
- Culinary Seniors Zoey Barnes and Sir Horrison qualified for the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) National Competition in Denver.
- Lima Senior Softball Coach Rob Nelson receive the Ohio High School Athletic Association's Sportsmanship, Ethics and Integrity Award.
- Lima Senior Art Teacher Kay Wilusz received an Ohio Art Education Foundation Grant to study glass work at the Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts.

CLASS OF **2023** MAKES ITS MARK, **READY** FOR THE FUTURE

The Lima Senior High School Class of 2023 did not disappoint, earning \$1.5 million in scholarship dollars and much-deserved recognition.

Lima Senior's 68th Commencement took place May 27, at Spartan Stadium, where about 180 graduates received their diplomas.

Those attending the ceremony cheered as they listened to the group's long list of accomplishments: Academic awards, athletic recognitions, art and music highlights and much more.

"Think of these and all the other things you have already accomplished in your short lives," Superintendent Jill Ackerman told the graduates. "Now imagine what's ahead. Think about what the world has in store for you, and what all you have to offer it."

This year's Valedictorian was Matilda Nelson, who will study biology and play softball at the University of Chicago. She plans to become an orthopedic surgeon.

The Salutatorian was Evan Large, who will be an English major at Ohio Wesleyan University. He wants to become a screenwriter.

Ackerman reminded graduates that they now join a 'mighty army of Spartans" who walked the same stage and then went out into the world excited yet also a little nervous about the future.

"But they did what Spartans always do – they showed courage and self-discipline – the definition of a Spartan," she said. "And then they went out and made their mark on the world. Now it is your turn to follow in their footsteps while also creating your own unique path."

The Class of 2023 had a busy few weeks heading into graduation, including completing senior projects, and attending the school's Honors Banquet, Academic and Military Signing Day, Career Tech Honors Night and Convocation.

Thanks to the generous support of Lima Senior graduating classes, families, organizations and businesses, the Class of 2023 graduated with having earned \$1.5 million in scholarships.

A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER

I began my professional career 21 years ago right here with the Lima City Schools, and am thrilled to return as the district's new treasurer. I've been back since May, catching up on the district's finances and getting reacquainted with this amazing staff.

A little about myself: I came to the Lima City Schools in 2002, working as an administrative assistant. In 2013, I moved to the Treasurer's Office as the accounting supervisor.

I made the decision to leave the district in 2018 to become the assistant treasurer at the Western Buckeye Educational Service Center in Paulding County. Most recently, I served as the assistant treasurer at the Allen County Educational Service Center.

I am committed to this district and leading it financially into the future. I believe in transparency and vow to be a good steward of your taxpayer dollars. Our number one priority will always be students and providing them the best education and experiences possible. I believe we can do that while still being fiscally responsible.

As we close out Fiscal Year 2023, I am happy to report that our revenues are higher than what we forecasted in November, and our spending is estimated to be \$6.5 million lower than originally projected in November.

We have several ongoing projects expected to be completed in Fiscal Year 2024, including a contained ADA-compliant All Abilities Playground at Heritage Elementary School. We will also continue with ongoing building maintenance projects and updating our infrastructure.

You will see a renewal levy for the district on the ballot in November. It first appeared on the ballot 10 years ago when we combined two existing renewals. The money assists with the general operations of the district. It will not cost taxpayers any additional money.

EFFORTS TO BRING VETERANS WALL OF HONOR TO LSH CONTINUE

The Lima City Schools continues to accept names and donations for its Veterans Wall of Honor to be located in front of Lima Senior High School.

Graduates of Lima Senior, South and Central High Schools who served active duty in the military are invited to sign up to have their names on the black granite wall that will stand six and a half feet tall.

A short form is required to be included on the wall. It can be accessed and completed digitally by going to www. limacityschools.org. Go to the "Community" tab and find "Veterans Wall of Honor."

Construction of the wall will not begin until the money is raised. No district, taxpayer money will be used. A fundraising campaign has begun in hopes of raising \$75,000. This will cover the initial build as well as leave funds to continue to add names to the wall well into the future. The district is looking for individuals, businesses, organizations and others to donate. Those donations exceeding \$5,000 will be recognized on a plaque that will hang inside Lima Senior.
